

2019 Local Government Forum "Tools for Conservation in the Kootenays – A Local Government Approach" March 13, 2019, Creston, BC

About the Forum

Kootenay Conservation Program (KCP) is working with local government representatives to deliver a Forum on tools for enhancing conservation benefits for communities in the Kootenays. This Forum is especially designed for local elected officials and staff to bring you up to speed on many of the new voluntary and regulatory tools that have been successfully used in BC to promote conservation and sustainability in local government activities. It's also a great opportunity to network with other local government elected officials and staff, and local organizations.

Why Does This Forum Matter to Local Governments?

Conservation is integral to living sustainably, having communities of all sizes be fire and drought resilient, and positioning our communities for climate change adaptation. As well, constituents of the Kootenays value nature ecosystems and conservation. The latest market research¹ in the Kootenays has found that:

Nearly all residents (95%) agree that it is important to protect the natural ecosystems and plant and wildlife species.

Concern over loss or extinction of fish and wildlife species rates very high (80%) with local residents 71% of residents agree that local and regional governments should do much more to conserve wildlife and their habitats on private land.
