Kootenay Conservation Program (KCP) is a broad partnership of more than 95 land and water conservation and stewardship groups, First Nations, other government agencies, agricultural producers, and educational institutions working throughout the East and West Kootenays. KCP’s vision is to have connected habitats and landscapes in the Kootenays that sustain biodiversity and naturally functioning ecosystems that, in turn, support community well-being. The partnership seeks to cooperatively conserve the biological diversity and naturally functioning ecosystems of the region through land conservation and stewardship while sharing knowledge and expertise, building financial support, and promoting collaboration. The KCP service area is in the traditional, ancestral, and unceded territories of the Ktunaxa, Secwépemc, Sinixt, and Syilx Okanagan peoples who have stewarded this land, water and all living things since time

immemorial, and whose values and cultures continue to inspire and guide stewardship of this region.
