

Columbia Valley Local Conservation Fund

Summary, February 2019

CVLCF Accomplishments

- \$1.77 million invested; Over \$17 million in partner dollars leveraged
- Supported securement of three properties:
 - Lot 48 (127 ha; 315 acres - part of network 7,600 ha; 18,500 acres)
 - Windermere West (a.k.a. SRL K2 Ranch) (4,529 hectares; 11,192 acres - property is comprised of 12 parcels)
 - Marion Creek Benchlands (220 ha; 544 acres)
- Supported over 80 projects that have focused on: restoration (grassland, creek and wetland); invasive plant management; species at risk recovery; water quality monitoring; climate conservation action and incentives for landowners

CVLCF Benefits

- Protecting land for ecological investment
- Citizen-science water quality monitoring
- Fewer invasive plants
- Protected bat colonies that reduce agricultural and forestry pests
- Recovery of species at risk (Kokanee, northern leopard frogs)
- Restoration activities that reduce fuel load and fire hazard
- Functioning wetlands, creeks, and grasslands that improve water quality
- Trails, boardwalks and signs increasing recreational benefits
- Economic opportunities for jobs, contracts, materials and supplies

CVLCF Leadership

- Columbia Valley Directors and their communities seen as innovative leaders
- Regional District of Central Kootenay (RDCK) established Local Conservation Fund in 2015 based on CVLCF example
- Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen (RDOS) established Local Conservation fund in 2017 based on CVLCF example

Supporting Goals of OCPs

The projects and acquisitions supported by the CVLCF have worked towards many of the values and goals outlined in the Columbia Valley's Official Community Plans including:

- “Encourage the **protection of natural ecosystems** unique to the plan area.” (Lake Windermere OCP)
- “Maintain **habitat connectivity** through undisturbed open space and wildlife corridors to support the movement of various wildlife species and access to foraging and nesting areas.” (Lake Windermere OCP)
- Retain **critical wildlife habitat, wildlife corridors and ungulate winter range**” (Toby Benches OCP)
- “Retain designated **wildlife corridors and undisturbed wildlife habitat**” (Steamboat Jubilee Mountain OCP)
- “... **protecting ecologically sensitive natural areas**, including floodplains, riparian zones and wildlife corridors” (Fairmont Hot Springs Area OCP)
- “Recognize **environmentally sensitive areas** and the animal and plant species that rely on these ecosystems...” (Toby Benches OCP)
- “Enhance the **wildlife and habitat values** surrounding the plan area by preserving important natural areas and wildlife corridors within the plan area.” (Fairmont Hot Springs Area OCP)
- “Protect the **wildlife and habitat values** surrounding the plan area by supporting conservation efforts in important natural areas and wildlife corridors” (Steamboat Jubilee OCP)
- “Recognize the importance of containing and **controlling noxious / invasive plants** and preventing their establishment” (Toby Benches OCP)
- “**Recognize the contribution that the natural environment and wildlife make** to the economy of the plan area” (Toby Benches OCP)
- “Support **rehabilitation, restoration and enhancement of environmentally sensitive areas** which were subject to negative impact in the past” (Toby Benches OCP)

Ongoing Benefits

The Directors of the Regional District of East Kootenay voted in November, 2016, to remove the date clause from the CVLCF Service Bylaw which continues this Fund indefinitely into the future.
